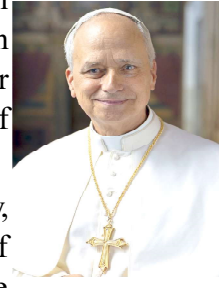

III. Pope Leo XIV's Message for 9th World Day of the Poor: 'You Are My Hope'

As the Church prepares to mark the Ninth World Day of the Poor on Sunday, 16 November 2025, Pope Leo XIV issues a message centered on the theme: "You are my hope", and expresses his hope that this Jubilee Year may encourage the development of policies aimed at combatting forms of poverty both old and new.



Drawing from the Psalms and the lived experience of those suffering poverty, Pope Leo XIV urges Christians to recognize the poor not as objects of charity but as protagonists of hope. He also expresses his hope that the Jubilee Year may be an occasion to implement "new initiatives to support and assist the poorest of the poor," and notes that "Labour, education, housing and health are the foundations of a security that will never be attained by the use of arms."

The Pope's message, released on the Feast Day of Saint Anthony of Padua, patron of the poor, calls on the faithful to rediscover Christian hope as a response to the instability that pervades our world. "Hope in God never disappoints," the Pope affirms, recalling Saint Paul's assurance that "we have our hope set on the living God".

Witnesses to hope amid hardship

Pope Leo notes how the poor, though deprived of material security, often embody a hope that is deep and enduring. "They cannot rely on the security of power and possessions... their hope must necessarily be sought elsewhere," he writes. It is precisely in this vulnerability, the Pope explains, that "we too pass from fleeting hopes to a lasting hope." "The gravest form of poverty," he continues, "is not to know God." Citing Pope Francis's *Evangelii Gaudium*, he highlights the fact that spiritual care must not be denied to the poor, who "have a special openness to the faith."

Hope as an anchor

The Holy Father goes on to recall how early Christians viewed hope as an anchor: "Christian hope is like an anchor that grounds our hearts in the promise of the Lord Jesus." In a world plagued by war, displacement, and environmental degradation, he insists that this hope remains the anchor holding human dignity fast. "Charity is not just a promise," the Pope reminds us. "It is a present reality to be embraced with joy and responsibility."

From the city of man to the city of God

Drawing a direct line between faith and social responsibility, the Pope recalls the Church's long-standing teaching that poverty must be addressed at its structural roots. "Poverty has structural causes that must be addressed and eliminated," he writes, calling for policies that reflect the Church's commitment to labour, education, housing and healthcare as universal rights. And decrying a culture of indifference, he points to the many "quiet signs of hope" -

care homes, soup kitchens, and low-income schools – that, he says, are too often overlooked.”The poor are not a distraction for the Church,” the Pope reiterates, “They are our beloved brothers and sisters... they put us in contact with the truth of the Gospel.”

A Jubilee of responsibility

Making his invitation all the more urgent, he reminds Christians that this year’s World Day of the Poor is closely linked to the ongoing Jubilee celebration: “Once the Holy Door is closed, we are to cherish and share with others the divine gifts granted us.”Thus, he urges believers to view the poor not merely as recipients of care, but as “creative subjects who challenge us to find novel ways of living out the Gospel today.”Pope Leo also echoes the wisdom of Saint Augustine, urging justice over mere generosity: “You give bread to a hungry person; but it would be better if none were hungry,” he quotes.

Concluding his message, the Pope entrusts all to Mary, Comforter of the Afflicted, inviting the Church and the world to raise a “song of hope” with the words of the Te Deum: “In you, O Lord, is our hope, and we shall never hope in vain.”

IV. Pope Leo’s First Apostolic Exhortation: DilexiTe Pope Leo in ‘Dilexite’: Faith cannot be separated from love for the poor

Taking up Pope Francis’ desire “that all Christians come to appreciate the close connection between Christ’s love and His summons to care for the poor,” Pope Leo XIV issues his first Apostolic Exhortation, “Dilexite,” as a call to Christ’s disciples “to recognize him in the poor and the suffering.”Pope Leo XIV’s first Apostolic Exhortation sees the love of Christ incarnated in love for the poor, in caring for the sick, opposing slavery, defending women who experience exclusion and violence, making education available to all, accompanying migrants, charitable giving, working for equality and more.

Dilexite (“I have loved you”, from Rev 3:9) unfolds in 121 numbered paragraphs spread throughout five chapters, and flows directly from the Gospel of the Son of God, Who in the very act of entering into our world through the Incarnation became poor for our sakes. At the same time, it repropose the Church’s social teaching, especially that of the past 150 years, as “a veritable treasury of significant teachings” concerning the poor.

Faith cannot be separated from love for the poor

Pope Leo XIV’s DilexiTe (“I have loved you” – Rev 3:9) is his first Apostolic Exhortation, issued as a passionate appeal to recognize Christ in the poor and suffering. Echoing Pope Francis’ call for a Church united in love and compassion, it emphasizes that faith without love for the poor is incomplete. Love of Christ, the document teaches, becomes tangible through service to the needy, care for the sick, opposition to slavery, defense of women, support for education, migrants, and equality.

Begun by Francis, completed by Pope Leo

Just as Francis completed Benedict XVI’s Lumen Fidei, Pope Leo took up Francis’ unfinished work for his first major document. DilexiTe builds upon Dilexit Nos on the Sacred Heart of Jesus, highlighting the inseparable link between divine love and love for the poor. The exhortation

reaffirms the Church's "preferential option for the poor," not as exclusion, but as participation in God's compassionate action toward human weakness.

The 'faces' of poverty

Pope Leo identifies multiple forms of poverty—material, social, moral, spiritual, and cultural. Poverty affects those lacking resources, rights, and freedom, and who are marginalized without a voice. The Pope laments that while concern for the poor has grown, it remains inadequate, and new, subtle forms of poverty continue to emerge, fueled by economic systems that deepen inequality.

'The dictatorship of an economy that kills'

The Holy Father critiques global economic structures that enrich a few while excluding millions, calling this imbalance "the dictatorship of an economy that kills." He challenges the illusion that poverty is diminishing, warning that progress is measured by outdated standards. He applauds UN efforts but stresses that ideologies defending absolute market autonomy perpetuate suffering.

The 'throwaway culture', market freedom, and pastoral care of the elites

Pope Leo condemns a "throwaway culture" that tolerates hunger and misery, hidden behind consumerist comfort. He rejects the false belief that free-market forces alone will solve poverty and warns against focusing ministry on the wealthy at the expense of the poor. Service to the poor, he insists, must be a meeting "between equals," where Christ is revealed and adored.

A change in mentality

True Christian life demands a change in mindset—freedom from the illusion that wealth brings happiness. The Pope urges believers to reject selfish lifestyles built on exploitation and to embrace solidarity with the suffering.

In every rejected migrant, it is Christ Himself who knocks

Migration is a central theme. Pope Leo recalls the tragedy of Alan Kurdi and the continuing neglect of migrants. He praises the Church's tireless work through refugee centers and border missions, noting that serving migrants is serving Christ Himself.

Women, victims of violence and exclusion

The Pope highlights women as "doubly poor," facing both economic and social discrimination. He calls for global recognition of their dignity and rights, condemning structures that sustain violence and exclusion.

'The poor are not there by chance'

Pope Leo rejects the notion that poverty is accidental or deserved, calling it the result of injustice and exploitation. He critiques meritocracy that glorifies the successful while demeaning the struggling, urging compassion over judgment.

Ideologies and political orientations

The Exhortation warns against Christians being shaped by secular ideologies that distort Gospel values. The Pope decries indifference that dismisses charity as outdated, reminding that almsgiving remains the heart of Christian mission.

Indifference on the part of Christians

Many Church groups, Pope Leo laments, show apathy toward the poor, focusing on rhetoric instead of action. He warns that communities ignoring the poor risk spiritual decay, falling into “religious worldliness” masked by empty talk. “We have to state, without mincing words, that there is an inseparable bond between our faith and the poor.” (36)

The witness of saints, blesseds, and religious orders

Pope Leo recalls saints who embodied a “poor Church for the poor”:

Francis of Assisi – embracing the leper.

Mother Teresa – symbol of tender charity.

The early saints and Fathers – Lawrence, Ambrose, Augustine—who taught that love of God without love for the poor is false. Religious orders like the Camillians, Benedictines, Franciscans, and Mercedarians who served the sick, freed captives, and educated the poor. Christian charity, he says, remains “liberating when it becomes incarnate” against modern forms of slavery—human trafficking, forced labour, and exploitation.

The right to education

Inspired by St. Joseph Calasanz, founder of free schools, Pope Leo proclaims education as a duty, not charity. Knowledge is a right, essential to human dignity and empowerment of the poor.

The efforts of popular movements

The Pope praises popular movements that resist “the empire of money,” often led by the marginalized themselves. Such movements, he says, restore the principle of acting with and of the poor, not merely for them.

The duty of making our voices heard

Pope Leo calls on all believers to denounce unjust structures and work for reform through moral conviction, science, and policy. Silence in the face of injustice, he warns, is complicity.

The poor at the heart of the Church

The document concludes with a powerful invitation: “It is evident that all of us must let ourselves be evangelized by the poor.” (102) The poor are not objects of charity but members of the family of God. The Church’s mission is not complete without them. Faith, worship, and justice are inseparable, and only when the Church bends down to serve the poor does she “assume her highest posture.”

Summary in essence:

Dilexi Te is Pope Leo XIV’s clarion call for a renewed Gospel of compassion—where faith is measured by love, and love finds its truest expression in solidarity with the poor. It is both a continuation of Francis’ vision and a prophetic challenge to the modern world: to see, serve, and be transformed by Christ present in every suffering face.

V. Solemnity of All Saints (Nov. 1)

On November 1st, we celebrate the solemnity of All Saints, which allows us to experience the joy of being part of the great family of God's friends, or as St. Paul writes, "to share in the inheritance of the saints in light" (Colossians 1:12). The liturgy again presents the expression full of surprise of the Apostle John: "See what love the Father has given us that we should be called children of God; and so we are" (1 John 3:1). Yes, to be saints means to realize fully what we already are insofar as raised in Christ Jesus to the dignity of adopted sons of God (cf. Ephesians 1:5; Romans 8:14-17).



With the incarnation of the Son, his death and resurrection, God willed to reconcile with himself the whole of humanity and allow it to share in his own life. He who believes in Christ the Son of God is reborn "from above," is again as though begotten by the work of the Holy Spirit (cf. John 3:1-8). This mystery is acted in the sacrament of baptism, through which Mother Church gives birth to "saints." The new life, received in baptism, is not subjected to corruption nor to the power of death. For one who lives in Christ, death is the passage of the earthly pilgrimage to the heavenly homeland, where the Father welcomes all his children, "from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and tongues," as we read today in the Book of Revelation (7:9). For this reason, it is very significant and appropriate that, after the feast of All Saints, the liturgy makes us celebrate tomorrow the commemoration of all the deceased faithful.

VI. All Souls Day (Nov. 2)

All Souls' Day, in Roman Catholicism, a day for commemoration of all the faithful departed, those baptized Christians who are believed to be in purgatory because they died with the guilt of lesser sins on their souls. It is observed on November 2. Roman Catholic doctrine holds that the prayers of the faithful on earth will help cleanse these souls in order to fit them for the vision of God in heaven, and the day is dedicated to prayer and remembrance. Requiem masses are commonly held, and many people visit and sometimes decorate the graves of loved ones. From antiquity certain days were devoted to intercession for particular groups of the dead.



The institution of a day for a general intercession on November 2 is due to Odilo, abbot of Cluny (died 1048). The date, which became practically universal before the end of the 13th century, was chosen to follow All Saints' Day. Having celebrated the feast of all the members of the church who are believed to be in heaven, the church on earth turns, on the next day, to commemorate those souls believed to be suffering in purgatory.

VII. Feast of Lateran Basilica Church (Nov. 9)

Today the Church celebrates the feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome, the oldest and highest ranking of the four major basilicas in Rome. The Basilica of St. John Lateran is the cathedral of the diocese of Rome, the official Ecclesiastical seat of the Holy Father, the Bishop of Rome, not St. Peter's Basilica as so many mistakenly believe.



The Basilica is also called the Church of Holy Savior or the Church of St. John Baptist. In ancient Rome this was the church where everyone was baptized. It is the oldest church in the West, built in the time of Constantine and was consecrated by Pope Sylvester in 324.

This feast became a universal celebration in honor of the arch-basilica, the ecclesiastical mother church, called "the mother and mistress of all churches of Rome and the world" (*omnium urbis et orbis ecclesiarum mater et caput*), as a sign of love for and union with the See of Peter. According to the 1962 Missal of St. John XXIII the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite, today is the commemoration of St. Theodore, a Christian soldier and martyr of Asia Minor.

VIII. Children's Day (Nov. 14)

Children's Day, celebrated on November 14, is recognized across India to increase awareness of the rights, care, and education of children. The day is also held as a tribute to India's First Prime Minister, Jawaharlal Nehru. Fondly known as "Chacha Nehru" among children, he advocated for children to have fulfilled education. Nehru considered children as the real strength of a nation and foundation of society. The nation usually celebrates Children's Day with educational and motivational programs held across India, by and for children. Unfortunately, all observances tend to become rituals over a period of time. No thought is given to the subjects of the celebration except to go through rigmarole in educational institutions where children are a captive audience.

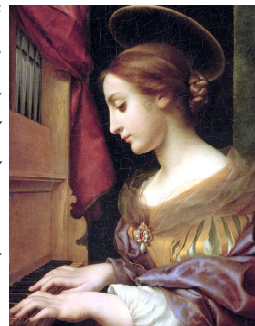


None of us care enough to find out statistics of children employed as domestic workers or in tea shops and other forms of labour.

It is true that India is a developing country and therefore to compare the development indices of developed countries to ours is not fair. Many families depend on the incomes brought by their adolescent children who are compelled to drop out of school on account of poverty and take up some kind of work. Article 24 of the Constitution of India prohibits child labour. There are other laws and the Indian Penal Code such as the Juvenile Justice (care and protection) of Children Act-2000, and the Child Labour (Prohibition and Abolition) Act-1986 provide a legal basis to identify, prosecute and stop child labour in India. But there is a huge gap between what the law says and how it is implemented.

IX. St. Cecilia, Patron of Music (Nov. 22)

St. Cecilia, Cecilia also spelled Cecily, (flourished 3rd century, Rome [Italy]; feast day November 22), one of the most famous virgin martyrs of the early church and historically one of the most discussed. She is a patron saint of music and of musicians. According to a late 5th-century legend, she was a noble Roman who, as a child, had vowed her virginity to God. When she was married against her will to the future saint Valerian, then a pagan, she told him that an angel of God wished her to remain a virgin. He promised to respect this wish if he were allowed to see the angel. She replied that he would if he were baptized. On his return from baptism he found Cecilia talking to the angel. She then converted his brother Tiburtius, who also saw the angel. Both men were martyred before she was. She distributed her possessions to the poor, which enraged the prefect Almachius, who ordered her to be burned. When the flames did not harm her, she was beheaded.



X. Solemnity of Christ the King (Nov. 23)

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe marks the grand conclusion of the Church's liturgical year. It is a feast that looks back over the mystery of Christ's life, death, and resurrection — and looks forward to the day when He will reign fully over all creation. The feast was instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI through the encyclical *Quas Primas*. It came at a time when the world was torn by wars, nationalism, and secularism. Many nations were turning away from faith, and ideologies were claiming the hearts of people. In this context, the Pope reminded the world that Christ alone is the true King, not any human power or ideology.



This historical background still speaks powerfully today. We live in a world where wealth, technology, and political influence often try to take the place of God. The feast of Christ the King reminds us that no earthly system or ruler can bring lasting peace — only Christ can. Unlike earthly kings, Christ's throne is the Cross, His crown is of thorns, and His law is love. His power is not displayed through armies or wealth but through mercy, service, and sacrifice. He reigns in hearts that choose truth over deceit, love over hatred, forgiveness over revenge. When Jesus told Pilate, "My kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36), He revealed that His rule is spiritual — a reign that transforms human hearts and renews the world from within. His kingdom begins wherever people live in justice, peace, and compassion. "Christ must reign." (1 Corinthians 15:25) May we let His reign begin within us — in our hearts, homes, and communities — until His kingdom of truth, justice, and peace fills the earth.

XIV. Communications

1. All Souls' Memorial

a) Celebration of Requiem Masses: Every Priest is permitted to celebrate three Masses on "All Souls Day" November 2, accepting stipend only for one Mass in virtue of the Apostolic Constitution of Pope Benedict XV.

First Mass: One can apply in favor of any person and accept a stipend for the Mass

Second Mass: Priests are bound to apply it for the faithful departed.

Third Mass: Priests are bound to apply it for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff.

b) Plenary indulgence (applicable only to souls in purgatory): Plenary indulgence is granted to any one of the faithful who devoutly visits the cemetery or who simply prays for the dead on one of the days from 1st to 8th of November. On All Souls' Day (or else with the permission of the Ordinary on Sunday that precedes or follows, or else on All Saints Day) visit a church or chapel with devotion and there recite the 'Our Father and the Creed'.

c) Partial Indulgence (applicable only to souls in purgatory): A partial indulgence is granted to any faithful who: a) Visits devoutly cemetery or who simply prays mentally for the dead. b) Recites Lauds or Vespers of the office of the Dead or the invocation, "eternal rest grant...".

NB: Kindly remit any excess Mass intentions of All Souls' Day to the Bishop's House.

2. Communio India contribution for the Year 2025: The Conference of the Catholic Bishops of India (CCBI) has come up with the idea of establishing a 'Funding Agency' in India, similar to the one like 'MISSIO' in Germany. The idea of establishing Communio is to raise funds in our country for our Country, with a view to helping the Mission Dioceses and Religious Congregations in India for the variety of needs they have. This year it falls on November 30, 2025. I request the Parish Priests to observe the Communio India Sunday on November 30, 2025 and send the offerings and contributions of that Sunday to Rev. Fr. Kommareddy Joseph, the procurator as early as possible. Kindly announce that they can contribute any Sunday/ Day of the year for the purpose. Let them take the envelopes and give back any day during the year. It is out of Love and obligation towards the Church in Motherland, India.

3. Advent Commences on November 30, 2025: Advent, (from Latin adventus, "coming"), in the Christian Church calendar, the period of preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ at Christmas and also of preparation for the Second Coming of Christ. In Western churches, Advent begins on the Sunday nearest to November 30 (St. Andrew's Day) and is the beginning of the liturgical year. In many Eastern churches, the Nativity Feast is a similar period of penance and preparation that occurs during the 40 days before Christmas. The date when the season was first observed is uncertain. Bishop Perpetuus of Tours (461–490) established a fast before Christmas that began on November 11 (St. Martin's Day), and the Council of Tours (567) mentioned an Advent season.

The liturgical meaning of the Advent season referred to the dual “coming” of Jesus—then Roman Catholicism the traditional liturgical color for Advent is violet; many Protestant denominations have adopted blue or purple. The third Sunday of Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday, is commonly marked by the use of rose-colored vestments and candles.

4. Celebrate Dalit Liberation Sunday – November 9, 2025

**Theme: “For such a time as this: Church in Mission with the Oppressed”
(Esther 4:14)**

As every year, the Church in India joyfully observes Dalit Liberation Sunday, and this year it will be celebrated on Sunday, 9th November 2025. The theme chosen for this year is “For such a time as this: Church in Mission with the Oppressed” (Esther 4:14) invites us to reflect deeply on our Christian call to stand in solidarity with the marginalized and to work together for justice, dignity, and equality for all.

The celebration of Dalit Liberation Sunday reminds us that the mission of the Church flows from the compassionate heart of Christ, who identifies Himself with the poor and the oppressed.

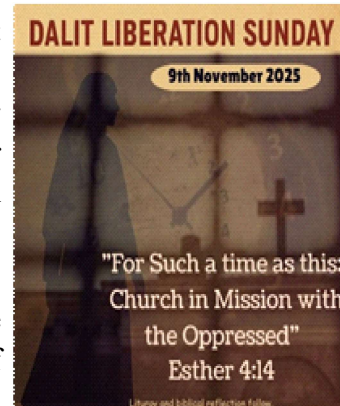
In our synodal journey, this celebration calls every parish and religious community to become a Church that listens, accompanies, and walks with those who suffer discrimination and exclusion.

I.Title of the Project: Poverty Reduction among Poor and Marginalised rural households with Livelihoods, Ecological farming and Natural Resource Management in 22 villages of Dharmasagar and Velair mandals of Hanumakonda district

i) 103 farmers were provided with sprayer pumps, solar light traps, neem oil, growth promoter, yellow plates to promote ecological farming methods and to improve the soil fertility and soil nutrients.

- ii) Distributed 10 varieties of vegetable seeds to 100 farmers to promote improved vegetable cultivation and get additional income and fresh vegetables for consumption purpose
- iii) Distributed fodder seeds to 50 members to grow fodder for milk animals and enhance milk yield.
- iv) Distributed 6 varieties of vegetable seeds to 500 women to promote Backyard vegetable gardening to enhance income and vegetable consumption.
- v) Distributed millets and traditional crop seeds to 140 farmers to enhance income with less investment.
- vi) Ten project staff went for Exposure camp at WOTR Organization, Jabalpur from 13th to 18th October, 2025. They visited natural resource management, livestock, organic farming activities etc. during their field visits.³

II. Care and Support Program for HIV infected / affected children

- Nutrition support was given to 150 children.
- Bi-Monthly meeting was conducted with 180 CLHA / PLHA's.
- An orientation talk was given to them on Children's education, Vocational and Digital training.
- As part of the capacity building programs, Peer Group Meeting was held for 40 CLHA and 11 CAA children.
- Capacity Building Program for youth on "Life skills, Participation and Accountability" was conducted at Lodi by Indian Social Institute, Bengaluru from 14th to 16th October.

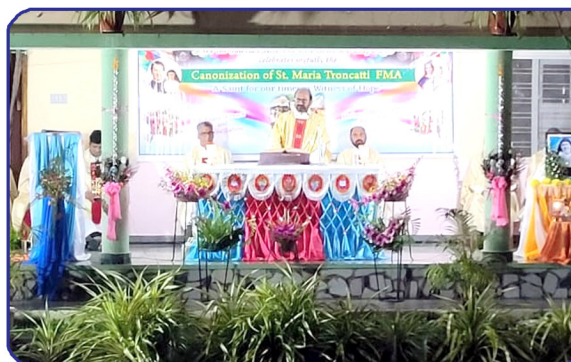
