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

History and Mystery of Our Lady of Fatima

History and Mystery of Our Lady of Fatima

Our Lady of the Holy Rosary of Fátima is a Catholic title of Mary, Mother of Jesus, based on the Marian apparitions reported in 1917 by three shepherd children at the Cova da Iria in Fátima, Portugal. The three children were Lúcia dos Santos and her cousins Francisco and Jacinta Marto. José Alves Correia da Silva, Bishop of Leiria, declared the events worthy of belief on 13 October 1930.

Pope Pius XII granted a pontifical decree of canonical coronation via the papal bull Celeberrima solemnia towards the venerated image on 25 April 1946. The designated papal legate, Cardinal Benedetto Aloisi Masella, carried out the coronation on 13 May 1946, now permanently enshrined at the Chapel of the Apparitions of Fátima. The same Roman Pontiff also raised the Sanctuary of Fátima to the status of a



Minor Basilica by the apostolic letter Luce superna on 11 November 1954. The published memoirs of Sister Lúcia in the 1930s revealed two secrets that she claimed came from the Virgin Mary, while the third secret was to be revealed by the Catholic Church in 1960. The controversial events at Fátima, including the Miracle of the Sun, gained fame due partly to elements of the secrets, prophecy and eschatological revelations supposedly related to the Second World War and possibly more global wars in the future, particularly the Virgin's request for the Consecration of Russia to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

History

Beginning in the spring of 1916, three shepherd children –Lúcia dos Santos, Francisco and Jacinta Marto–reported three apparitions of an Angel in Valinhos. Then on 13 May 1917, in Cova da Iria, six apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary were reported. The children described her as "a Lady more brilliant than the Sun". The children reported a prophecy that prayer would lead to an end to the Great War, and that on 13 October that year the Lady would reveal her identity and perform a miracle "so that all may believe." Newspapers reported the prophecies, and many pilgrims began visiting the area. The children's accounts were deeply controversial, drawing intense criticism from both local secular and religious authorities. A provincial administrator briefly took the children into custody, believing the prophecies were politically motivated in opposition to the officially secular First Portuguese Republic established in 1910.

On 13 May 1917, the shepherd children reported seeing a woman "brighter than the sun, shedding rays of light clearer and stronger than a crystal goblet filled with the most sparkling water and pierced by the burning rays of the sun." The woman wore a white mantle edged with gold and held a rosary in her hand. She asked them to devote themselves to the Holy Trinity and to pray "the Rosary every day, to bring peace to the world and an end to the war". While the children had never told anyone about seeing the angel, Jacinta told her family about seeing the brightly lit woman. Lúcia had earlier said that the three should keep this experience private. Jacinta's disbelieving mother told neighbours about it as a joke, and within a day the whole village knew of the children's vision.

Mystery

The children said the woman told them to return to the Cova da Iria on 13 June 1917. Lúcia's mother sought counsel from the parish priest, Father Manuel Ferreira, who suggested she allow them to go. He asked to have Lúcia brought to him afterward so that he could question her. The second appearance occurred on 13 June, the feast of Saint Anthony, patron of the local parish church. Lúcia would later report that on this occasion, the lady revealed that Francisco and Jacinta would be taken to Heaven soon, but Lúcia would live longer in order to spread her message and devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

During the June visit, the children said the lady told them to say the Holy Rosary daily in honour of Our Lady of the Rosary to obtain peace and the end of the Great War. Fr. Ferreira later stated that Lúcia recounted that the lady told her, "I want you to come back on the thirteenth and to learn to read in order to understand what I want of you." In the following months, thousands of people flocked to Fátima and nearby Aljustrel, drawn by reports of visions and miracles. On 13 August 1917, the government provincial administrator Artur Santos (no relation to Lúcia dos Santos) intervened. He believed that these events were politically disruptive in the conservative country. He took the children into custody, jailing them before they could reach the Cova da Iria. Santos interrogated and threatened the children to get them to divulge the contents of the secrets. Lúcia's mother hoped the officials could persuade the children to end the affair and admit that they had lied. Lúcia told Santos everything short of the secrets, and offered to ask the woman for permission to tell the secrets.

That month, instead of the usual apparition in the Cova da Iria on 13 August, the children reported that they saw the Virgin Mary on 19 August, a Sunday, at nearby Valinhos. She asked them again to pray the rosary daily, spoke about the miracle coming in October, and asked them "to pray a lot, a lot for the sinners and sacrifice a lot, as many souls perish in hell because nobody is praying or making sacrifices for them." The three children claimed to have seen the Blessed Virgin Mary in a total of six apparitions between 13 May and 13 October 1917. After some newspapers reported that the Virgin Mary had promised a miracle for the last of her apparitions on 13 October, a huge crowd, possibly between 30,000 and 100,000, including reporters and photographers, gathered at Cova da Iria. That was the "Miracle of the Sun".

Our Lady of Fatima continues to work miracles today

The 'miracle of the sun' in Fátima helped to end an atheist regime. The stunning event was a direct and very convincing contradiction to the atheistic regimes at the time, which is evidenced by the fact that the first newspaper to report on the miracle on a full front page was an anti-Catholic, Masonic newspaper in Lisbon called O Seculo. The miracle of the sun was understood by the people to be "the seal, the guarantee, that in fact those three children were telling the truth". Even today, "Fátima makes people change their perception of God," since "one of the most important messages of the apparitions is that even if someone has separated from God, God is present in human history and doesn't abandon humanity."

The reported visions at Fátima gathered widespread attention as numerous pilgrims began to visit the site. After a canonical inquiry, the Bishop of Leiria-Fátima officially declared the visions of Fátima as "worthy of belief" in October 1930, officially permitting the belief of Our Lady of Fátima. The year 2017 marked the 100th anniversary of the apparitions and it was celebrated with the visit of Pope Francis to the Sanctuary of Fátima.

III. Lenten Message of the Holy Father: Lent calls us to journey together in hope

In his Message for Lent 2025, Pope Francis invites the faithful to "journey together in hope,"

and to take the opportunity of the upcoming Lenten Season to ask ourselves whether we are truly willing to heed God's call to change our lives. The central theme of Pope Francis' Lenten Message is encapsulated in the phrase "Let us journey together in hope," which ties into the broader theme of the Jubilee Year -"Pilgrims of Hope." The Pope's reflection focuses on conversion and unfolds in three key dimensions: the importance of journeying, journeying together, and journeying with hope.

Our life of faith is a journey of conversion

Recalling the biblical Exodus of the people of Israel from Egypt to the

Promised Land, the Pope reminds us that our lives too are a journeyone that should be directed toward God. This journey is not merely a metaphorical one but involves a constant call to conversion, "to leave behind the occasions of sin" and situations that degrade our human dignity. Pope Francis, therefore, urges the faithful during this Lenten Season to examine their own lives: are they actively progressing on the path of spiritual renewal or are they held back by fear and hopelessness or reluctant to move out of their comfort zone?

Drawing a parallel between the Hebrew people's "arduous path from slavery to freedom" and the plight of modern migrants and refugees, the Pope invites us to use this period as an opportunity to consider how we relate our own lives with the struggles of those who are forced to flee "situations of misery and violence in search of a better life" and "in this way discover what God is asking of us." This, he writes, "would be a good 'examination of conscience' for all of us wayfarers."

"It is hard to think of the biblical exodus without also thinking of those of our brothers and sisters who in our own day are fleeing situations of misery and violence in search of a better life for themselves and their loved ones. A first call to conversion thus comes from the realization that all of us are pilgrims in this life."

The call to journey together: a summons to synodality

A fundamental aspect of the Lenten Message is the emphasis on community and synodality—the idea that Christians must walk together rather than in isolation. Pope Francis reminds us, "The Holy Spirit impels us not to remain self-absorbed, but to keep walking towards God and our brothers and sisters.""Journeying together,"he writes, "means consolidating the unity grounded in our common dignity as children of God, without letting anyone be left behind or excluded."Again, he challenges the faithful to reflect on whether we are capable of walking together with others in our families, workplaces, and communities, resisting the temptation to become self-absorbed. Are we welcoming to others? Do we include those who feel marginalized?

"Let us ask ourselves in the presence of the Lord whether, as bishops, priests, consecrated persons and laity in the service of the Kingdom of God, we cooperate with others. Whether we show ourselves welcoming, with concrete gestures, to those both near and far. Whether we make others feel a part of the community or keep them at a distance."

The call to journey in hope

The third fundamental dimension of the Lenten journey is hope, anchored in God's promise of salvation and eternal life fulfilled in Jesus' Resurrection, the victory over sin and death. This hope is not abstract but must be lived concretely. Pope Francis invites us to examine whether we truly trust in God's mercy. Do we believe in His forgiveness, or do we fall into the trap of self-reliance? And do we concretely experience the hope that inspires in us "a commitment to justice and fraternity, to care for our common home and in such a way that no one feels excluded?" Referencing Saint Teresa of Avila, the message urges the faithful to remain watchful and patient, understanding that God's promises will be fulfilled in His time.

"This was the prayer of Saint Teresa of Avila: 'Hope, O my soul, hope. You know neither the day nor the hour. Watch carefully, for everything passes quickly, even though your impatience makes doubtful what is certain, and turns a very short time into a long one."

Pope concludes by entrusting this journey of hope to the intercession of the Virgin Mary, "Mother of Hope," praying that she may accompany the faithful as we prepare to celebrate the joy of Easter.

మొదటిగా, ప్రయాణించుట. జూబిలీ నినాదము, "నిరాక్షణ యాత్రికులు", నిర్గమకాండములో వివరించిన విధముగా, ఇస్రాయేలీ ప్రజలను వాగ్దాత్త భూమికి నడిపించిన సుదీర్ఘ ప్రయాణాన్ని గుర్తుచేస్తుంది. దాస్యము నుండి స్వాతంత్ర్యమునకు నడిపించిన ఈ కఠినమైన మార్గము, తమను (పేమించు, విశ్వాసపాత్రముగానుందు ప్రభువుచేత చిత్తగింపబడి నడిపింపబడినది. 36th Plenary Assembly, Jan 28 to Feb 4, 2025, Bhubaneswar LETTER TO THE PEOPLE OF GOD IN INDIA Pilgrims of Hope: Discerning the Synodal Path For we walk by faith, not by sight (2 Cor 5:7)

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We, the 145 Archbishops and Bishops representing the 132 dioceses of the Conference of the Catholic Bishops of India (CCBI), gathered at the XIM University, Bhubaneswar, Odisha, for our 36th Plenary Assembly from 28th January to 4th February 2025, send you greetings of Peace, Love and Joy.

The Synod on Synodality, with its emphasis on Communion, Participation and Mission, has deepened our understanding of the Church as the People of God. As a follow-up of the Synod, considering the Final Document of the Synod, we came together to deliberate, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, on how to journey further towards a Synodal Church. The theme of our Plenary was: **Discerning Synodal Pathways for Mission.**

The Church in India embarked upon three journeys towards a synodal Church. First, at the universal level, in response to Pope Francis' call for a synodal Church, the Conference initiated an extensive consultation process from October 2021 to July 2022, culminating in the collation of reports from 130 dioceses into the CCBI's National Synthesis (August 2022). Secondly, at the Asian level, the Federation of Asian Bishops' Conferences (FABC), marking its Golden Jubilee, undertook prayerful discernment by representative Bishops of Asian countries, culminating in the FABC Bangkok 50 Document: Journeying Together as Peoples of Asia ... and they went a different way (Matt 2:12) (March 2023). Finally, the CCBI engaged in a massive consultation process, involving close to 5,000 people, culminating in the Pastoral Plan - Journeying Towards a Synodal Church: Mission 2033 (September 2024).

The CCBI reviewed the fruits of these journeys and prepared the Working Document for the Plenary Assembly. The Working Document outlined ten themes which served as a framework for us to engage in prayerful reflection, listening and discernment. The methodology used at the Plenary was "Spiritual Conversation": listening prayerfully to "what the Spirit says

to the Churches" (Revelation 2:7). All the participants felt powerfully the movement of the Holy Spirit. The Bishops expressed their intention to use this methodology in all structures of participation, such as parish and diocesan pastoral and financial councils, in arriving at decisions on administration, governance and ministry-related matters that could help the Church immensely.

Searching for synodal pathways for the coming years, we discerned the following themes that would need attention: Faith Formation and Word of God, Children, Family, Youth, Laity, Basic Ecclesial Communities, Migrants and Refugees, Dalits, Tribals/Adivasis/Indigenous Peoples, Socially Excluded People, Women and Gender Justice, Poverty and Equitable Economy, Digital Technology and Social Media, Ecology and Climate Stewardship, Ecumenism and Inter-religious Dialogue, and finally, Peacebuilding. The CCBI will soon share in a more elaborate manner the fruits of this Plenary for the benefit of all.

The purpose of the Synod of Bishops was "to plant dreams, draw forth prophecies and visions, allow hope to flourish, inspire trust, bind up wounds, weave together relationships, awaken a dawn of hope, learn from one another, and create a bright resourcefulness that will enlighten minds, warm hearts, give strength to our hands" (Pope Francis' Address at the Opening of the Synod of Bishops on Young People, 3 October 2018). The Synod is not a destiny nor a distant future but a process of active engagement. We see our 36th Plenary Assembly as one step forward in this ongoing process.

With sentiments of deep affection and spiritual closeness, we would like to thank you, the lay faithful, consecrated persons and priests, for your participation in various consultation processes undertaken so far and for your prayers for the Plenary Assembly. In our prayers, we gratefully remembered you, the laity, especially the faithful of Cuttack-Bhubaneswar Archdiocese and, with pain and hope, all those who sacrificed and bore witness to the faith during the Kandhamal persecution.

It is our heartfelt desire that we, as a synodal family, journey towards a synodal Church. We invite committed members of the Church to walk together as we seek to take new Synodal Pathways for Mission under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. May Mary, Mother of the Church, who walks with us on our pilgrimage, guide us as we embark on a synodal path with missionary zeal as Pilgrims of Hope, especially during this Jubilee Year 2025 and in the coming years.

VI. Lent: Time for Transformation (March 5)

Few times in the Christian year call us to reflect on transformational change like Lent leading toward Easter. Springtime is lush with rebirth, new beginnings, and new growth. Too often, however, we want to race to the Easter Resurrection without fully embracing the Lenten process



that leads there. Lent reflects the forty days that Jesus wandered in the wilderness — tempted by Satan — in readiness for a ministry destined to end in tragedy. Few of us can relate to the level of sacrifice and commitment that Jesus displayed in his forty days, yet Lent provides us with an opportunity to deepen our spirituality by engaging in regular discipline from Ash Wednesday through Easter Sunday. The wilderness — the desert days of Lent — is the true path toward spiritual transformation. There is a compelling metaphor that helps us embrace the wilderness and prevents us from racing to Easter. It is the metaphor of the seed. Jesus began his teaching ministry with the parable of the sower (Matthew 13) and referred to seeds and trees, fruit and branches, throughout his ministry. To see the metaphor of Christian growth and spiritual development contained in a seed is to learn valuable lessons about change and transformation. Receive these six lessons from the seed as six weekly devotionals for this Lenten season. Incorporate them into your daily meditations so that they might grow to full bloom in your heart.

Three Timeless Practices of Lent: Praying, Fasting. Almsgiving

a) Fasting: Fast from watching television one night each week so that you can spend time on a Lenten practice, such as praying, reading the Bible and serving others. Fast from one movie during Lent and give the money and the time in service to others. Fast from using foul language and put-downs and start affirming the good in other people. Fast from buying new things like clothes, music, magazines, or jewelry and make a donation... Fast from spending money on entertainment and make a donation of time or money that serves others. Fast from holding resentments and start practicing forgiveness. Fast from gossiping or being dishonest and start the practice of always being truthful and honest. Fast from a favorite snack food or drink and set aside the money you would have spent to donate to a special charity. Fast from being angry or upset with people who have hurt or offended you, and pray for the courage to

forgive them. Fast from feeling guilty and angry at yourself for things you have done wrong, instead remember God's great love for you.

- b) **Praying:** Pray for a forgiving heart and ask the people you have hurt to forgive you. Participate in Ash Wednesday services with your family. Participate in the Stations of the Cross during Lent. Participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation during Lent. Rent the video, The Prince of Egypt. Watch the video and read the story of Moses from the Book of Exodus, chapters 2-15. Try to read one chapter each day. Be sure to read the story of the Passover in chapters 12 through 13:22. List three blessings you have been given. Say a prayer to God, giving thanks for the blessings in your life. Pray for the children and families who are homeless, and think about ways you and your family might help them.
- c) **Serving/Almsgiving:** Show an act of kindness to each family member today. Show an act of kindness to a friend and to someone who is difficult to like. Together with your family, spend time serving others during Lent. Work at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter. Visit elderly people who are in nursing homes or are shut-ins. Bring food or clothing to the parish or community food pantry, food bank, or homeless shelter. Do someone else's chores one day this week. Donate a new item of children's clothing to the local homeless shelter or clothing center. Go through your closet and find some clothes in good shape to give away to other children who are in need of clothes. Write a letter or create a card for someone who is sick or might be lonely. Buy a can of food to give to a food bank or homeless shelter. Talk with your family about eating one simple meal each week of Lent and putting the money you save in the Operation Rice Bowl box or giving the money to a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.

VII. International Women's Day (March 8)

International Women's Day is a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural and

political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity. Significant activity is witnessed worldwide as groups come together to celebrate women's achievements or rally for women's equality. Marked annually on March 8th, International Women's Day (IWD) is one of the most important days of the year to:



- celebrate women's achievements
- raise awareness about women's equality
- lobby for accelerated gender parity
- fundraise for female-focused charities

What's the theme for International Women's Day?

The campaign theme for International Women's Day 2025 is "Accelerate Action."

Do we still need an International Women's Day?

Yes! There's no place for complacency. According to the World Economic Forum, sadly none of us will see gender parity in our lifetimes, and nor likely will many of our children. Gender parity will not be attained for almost a century.

VIII. Solemnity of St. Joseph: Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary(March 19)

St. Joseph was an ordinary manual laborer although descended from the royal house of David.

In the designs of Providence he was destined to become the spouse of the Mother of God. His high privilege is expressed in a single phrase, "Foster-father of Jesus." About him Sacred Scripture has little more to say than that he was a just man-an expression which indicates how faithfully he fulfilled his high trust of protecting and guarding God's greatest treasures upon earth, Jesus and Mary.



The darkest hours of his life may well have been those when he first learned of Mary's pregnancy; but precisely in this time of trial Joseph showed himself great. His suffering, which likewise formed a part of the work of the redemption, was not without great providential import: Joseph was to be, for all times, the trustworthy witness of the Messiah's virgin birth. After this, he modestly retires into the background of holy Scripture. Of St. Joseph's death the Bible tells us nothing. There are indications, however, that he died before the beginning of Christ's public life. His was the most beautiful death that one could have, in the arms of Jesus and Mary. Humbly and unknown, he passed his years at Nazareth, silent and almost forgotten he remained in the background through centuries of Church history. Only in more recent times has he been

accorded greater honor. Liturgical veneration of St. Joseph began in the fifteenth century, fostered by Sts. Brigid of Sweden and Bernadine of Siena. St. Teresa, too, did much to further his cult. At present there are two major feasts in his honor. On March 19 our veneration is directed to him personally and to his part in the work of redemption, while on May1 we honor him as the patron of workmen throughout the world and as our guide in the difficult matter of establishing equitable norms regarding obligations and rights in the social order.

IX. The Feast of the Annunciation (March 25)

The Feast of the Annunciation is one of the most important in the Church calendar. First, it celebrates the actual Incarnation of Our Savior -- the Word made flesh in the womb of His mother, Mary. Second, it is a principal Marian feast. Two other feasts honoring Our Lord's mother, the Assumption (August 15), and the Immaculate Conception (December



8), are celebrated as Holy Days of Obligation in the United States. The biblical account of the Annunciation is in the first chapter of the Gospel of St. Luke, which describes the news given to Mary that she was to become the mother of the Incarnation of God, records the "angelic salutation" of Gabriel to Mary, 'Hail, thou who art highly favored. The Lord is with thee." This is the origin of the repeated "Hail Mary" prayer of the Rosary); and Mary's response to God's will, "Let it be done to me according to thy word." Her exultant hymn, the Magnificent, found in Luke 1:46-55, has been part of the Church's liturgy of the hours, at Vespers (evening prayer), and has been repeated nightly in churches, convents and monasteries for many centuries.

The significance of this Christian feast on Western culture is made clear from the fact that New Years Day used to be celebrated on March 25. This was the case in England until as late as 1752. Another remnant of the historic universality of Christianity in the world is the universal use of BC (before Christ) and AD (Anno Domini -- The Year of Our Lord) to denote periods of time in history. Although there has been an attempt in some circles to change 'BC' to 'BCE' (before the common era), AD to CE (common era), and although it is true that the religious significance of our system of dating has been effectively obliterated, nevertheless, Christians and non-Christians alike consent to the birth of Christ as the "fulcrum" of the dating the events of human history.

1. Hearty Congratulations to Most Rev. Dr. Udumala Bala new Archbishop of Visakhapatnam: The Holy Father Pope Francis has appointed Bishop Udumala Bala Showreddy (70) as the Archbishop of Vishakapatnam in Adhra Pradesh transferring him from the diocese of Warangal on February 8, 2025.

He was appointed Bishop of Warangal on April 13, 2013 and ordained Bishop on May 23, 2013. He was the Apostolic Administrator of the diocese of Khammam from 2022 to 2024. He was the Deputy Secretary General of the CCBI from 2006 to 2013 and the Chairman of the CCBI



Commission for Vocations, Seminaries, Clergy and Religious from 2015 to 2023.

Bishop Bala was born on June 18, 1954, in Ghanpur, Gudur, Diocese of Warangal, Andhra Pradesh. He began elementary school in his native village of Gudur and then completed high school at St. Gabriel High School, Warangal. He holds a Diploma in Telugu and a Bachelor of Arts from Usmania University. He did his priestly formation in St. Pius X Minor Seminary, Fatima Nagar, Warangal and to St. John's Regional Seminary, Ramanthapur, Hyderabad.

He was ordained a priest on February 20, 1979, for the diocese of Warangal. After his priestly ordination he held the following positions: 1979-1980: Parish Vicar in Dornakal; 1980-1984: parish priest in Produtur; 1984-1985: parish priest in Ravi Nuthala; 1985-1986: parish priest in Cherumadaram; 1986-1987: Financial Administrator and Chancellor of the diocese; 1987-1990: Procurator and Catechetical Teacher at St. John's Regional Seminary, Hyderabad; 1990-1994: Studies at the Alphonsianum, Rome, where he obtained a doctorate in Moral Theology; 1994-1997: Professor of Moral Theology at St. John's Regional Seminary, Hyderabad; 1997-2006: Rector of St. John's Regional Seminary, Hyderabad. Archdiocese of Visakhapatnam became vacant by the resignation of Archbishop Prakash Mallavarapu on February 14, 2024.

6. NEWS from Lodi MSSS:

I. Title of the Project: Poverty Reduction among Poor and Marginalised rural households with Livelihoods, Ecological farming and Natural Resource Management in 22 villages of Dharmsagar and Velair mandals of Hanumakonda district.

Achievements in February:

- i) Renovated 4 Feeder channels in 4 project villages and 80 farmers were benefitted with increase of irrigation and recharge of bore wells.
- ii) Four small ponds in 4 project villages were renovated by clearance of jungle on the bund and strengthened the bund and 120 farmers were benefitted with the increase of irrigation sources.
- iii) 120 farmers were provided with plastic drums, cans, neem oil, growth promoter, yellow plates, pheromone traps to promote ecological farming methods to improve the soil fertility and soil nutrients.
- **II. Title of the Project:** Sustainable Livelihood Based Food Security program for the Tribal, Dalit and Backward Class Communities of 23 villages of AKKANNAPET Mandal of SIDDIPET district of TELANGANA State.

Achievements in February:

- 317 units of backyard chickens were distributed to 317 women in 23 villages to enhance secondary income of the target families and also to promote usage of eggs in their daily food.
- We have selected 100 farmers from 23 villages and constructed 100 Vermi Compost Pits. Applying this compost improves the soil fertility and increases soil moisture content, thereby reduce expenditure on chemical fertilizers.
- 112 Farmers were provided traditional food crop seeds and cultivated in 121 acres of land in 23 project villages.
- 108 farmers were provided Fodder seeds and cultivated in 68 acres of land for animal husbandry.

III. Care and Support Program for HIV/AIDS infected / affected children

- Nursing Students from Australian Catholic University had an exposure visit to Lodi and learned about the field activities and services of Lodi.
- Two coordinators from Lodi attended the ISI (Indian Social Institute) Bengaluru state level training and orientation program on resource mobilization and



leadership qualities. 1) CLHA Nutrition support was given to 150 children. 2) CHAI

organization provided one day training program on CLHA registration form online data collection system.

IV. Revolving Fund Loans

- During the month of February, 41 beneficiaries of 2 villages were supported with the loan of Rs. 8,00,000/-.
- 105 members of Fatima Mahila Sahakara Sangham of 65 villages of 28 parishes were given the loan of Rs. 1,09,25,000/-
- Total contribution towards Savings of Fatima Mahila Sahakara Sangham: Rs. 3,86,850/-.
