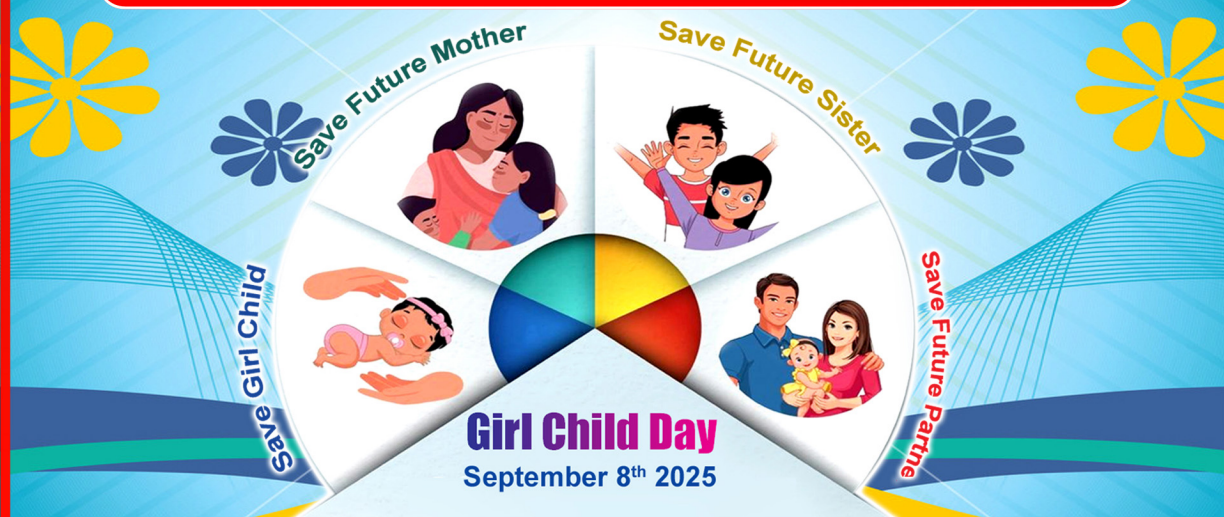

I. Rooted in the Word, Renewed in Mission: A September Journey of Faith

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we step into the month of **September**, the Church invites us to journey deeper into the mystery of Christ through her liturgical celebrations and spiritual observances. This month is especially meaningful because it is dedicated to the **Word of God and to Catechetical Formation**, reminding us of our call to root our lives firmly in the Scriptures and in the teachings of the Church.

We begin this month with “**World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation**” on 1st September 2025.



We continue this month, with the celebration of the **Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (September 8th)**. Mary, the Mother of the Word Incarnate, is the shining model of faith and obedience. Her birth is a sign of hope, for through her, God prepared the way for the salvation of the world. May her maternal intercession inspire our communities to grow in holiness and unity.

On **September 14th**, we celebrate the **Exaltation of the Holy Cross**, a feast that calls us to embrace the Cross not as a burden but as a source of victory. The Cross reminds us that suffering, when united with Christ, becomes redemptive. In today’s world, where many face challenges—be they economic struggles, family difficulties, or spiritual dryness—this feast strengthens us to carry our crosses with courage and faith.

As we continue to celebrate the Jubilee Year 2025, with the theme “Pilgrims of Hope”, the diocese has planned for Three celebrations during this month.

1. **Jubilee celebrations for Catechists** on 13th September, with the collaboration of CSA Sisters, Jyothirmai Society and Pastoral Centre.
2. **Jubilee celebrations for Children** on 27th September with the collaboration of FCT.
3. **Jubilee celebrations for youth** on 28th September with the collaboration of FCT & Arunodaya Youth Centre.

For our diocese and for all of us, may the Jubilee year be a year of grace, peace, joy and a time of renewal and mission. May it be a grace filled time for our diocese, leading us to greater faith, deeper communion and renewed zeal for mission.

Furthermore, September is also the month dedicated to **Catechetical Sunday**, a time to recognize and encourage the mission of catechists. They play a vital role in handing on the faith to children, youth, and adults. Let us support them in their noble ministry and remember that every Christian, by virtue of baptism, is also a witness and teacher of the faith.

Dear friends, as an ecclesial family, let us allow the **Word of God** to illumine our daily lives. Let us renew our commitment to prayer, catechesis, and service, so that our parishes may become true schools of discipleship and mission.

II. Holy Father's General Intention: For our Relationship with all of Creation

Let us pray that, inspired by Saint Francis, we might experience our interdependence with all creatures who are loved by God and worthy of love and respect.

III. Pope's Message for World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation: God's Creation is not a Battleground for Vital Resources

In his Message for the 10th World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, Pope Leo XIV quotes extensively from Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato si'*, denouncing environmental and social injustice and noting that God's creation is not intended to be a battleground for vital resources.



As the Church prepares to mark the Tenth World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation on 1 September 2025, Pope Leo XIV's message for the occasion urges Christians and all people of goodwill to recognize the urgent need for environmental and social justice in a world increasingly scarred by climate change, conflict, and inequality.

Entitled *Seeds of Peace and Hope* and released on July 2, the Pope's message resonates with the spirit of the ongoing Jubilee Year, calling the faithful to embrace their role as "pilgrims of hope" and stewards of God's creation.

Justice in a wounded world

Echoing the prophetic words of Isaiah, Pope Leo invites the global community to envision a transformation of today's "arid and parched desert" into "a fruitful field." This biblical vision, he explains, is not a poetic metaphor but an urgent call to action in the face of alarming ecological and human crises.

Quoting extensively from Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato si'* in the year of its 10th anniversary, he writes, "Injustice, violations of international law and the rights of peoples, grave inequalities, and the greed that fuels them are spawning deforestation, pollution, and the loss of biodiversity."

Linking environmental destruction to the exploitation of the poor and marginalized, he highlights the disproportionate suffering of indigenous communities and the widening gap between rich and poor as hallmarks of a system that treats nature as a commodity rather than a common home.

Nature as a battleground

He laments the fact that nature itself has become "a bargaining chip," subjected to policies and practices that prioritize profit over people and the planet. From agricultural lands riddled with landmines to conflicts over water and raw materials, Pope Leo paints a sobering picture of a creation "turned into a battleground" for control and domination. These wounds, he says, are "the effect of sin," a betrayal of the biblical command not to dominate creation, but to "till and keep" it, a call to cultivate and preserve the Earth through a relationship of care and responsibility.

Environmental justice as a moral imperative

The Pope's message reaffirms the Church's commitment to an "integral ecology," a concept at the heart of *Laudato si'*. Environmental justice, the Holy Father affirms, is not an abstract or secondary concern but a "duty born of faith."

"For believers," he writes, "the universe reflects the face of Jesus Christ, in whom all things were created and redeemed." In this light, caring for the planet becomes not only an ecological necessity but also a profoundly spiritual and moral vocation.

Seeds that bear fruit

Encouraging concrete action, Pope Leo calls for perseverance and love in sowing "seeds of justice" that will, in time, bear the fruits of peace. He cites the Borgo *Laudato Si'* project at Castel Gandolfo as a tangible example of how education and community life rooted in ecological values can shape a just and hopeful future.

"This may take years," the Pope acknowledges, "but years that involve an entire ecosystem made up of continuity, fidelity, cooperation and love."

A blessing for the future

Concluding his message with a prayer for the outpouring of God's Spirit, Pope Leo XVI invokes the hope of the risen Christ as the guiding light for a world longing for healing.

"May [*Laudato si'*] continue to inspire us," he writes, "and may integral ecology be increasingly accepted as the right path to follow."

IV. Feast of St. Theresa of Calcutta (Sep. 5)

On August 26, 1910, Mother Teresa was born Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu in Skopje, Macedonia. As a young girl she was very involved in parish activities, and her mother told her many stories of missionaries, who inspired her greatly. In 1928, at age 18, Agnes joined the missionary order of the Sisters of Loreto in Dublin, Ireland. There she was given the name Sister Mary Teresa. As a young Sister in 1929 she traveled to Calcutta (today known as Kolkata), India, to teach at a school for



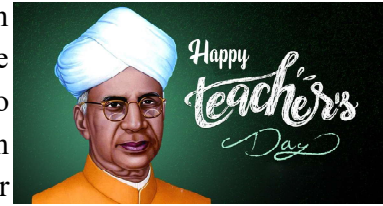
girls. She continued to teach at various schools in India for 20 years. During that time, she was deeply moved by the number of sick and dying people on the streets. On September 10, 1946, while traveling by train to Darjeeling, Sister Mary Teresa experienced a "call within a call." She felt called to be God's love in action: to serve the sick and dying, the hungry and homeless. She received permission to leave the Loreto convent. Then she sought medical training and became determined to serve the poorest of the poor. Eventually, she was joined by other women. Some of these women were her former students, and they helped her serve the poor. In 1950 she established an order of religious women called the Missionaries of Charity.

Over time the Missionaries of Charity have built centers throughout the world. In 1979 Mother Teresa, as she was known by then, received the Nobel Peace Prize. She captivated the world as few other people have. Her simple message was: “We are put on earth to do something beautiful for God.” Mother Teresa’s spiritual vitality can be described with these words. “Don’t search for God in faraway lands. He is not there. He is close to you. He is with you. Just keep that lamp burning, and you will always see him.

V. Teachers’ Day (Sep. 5)

EDUCATION FEST (August 29-September 5)

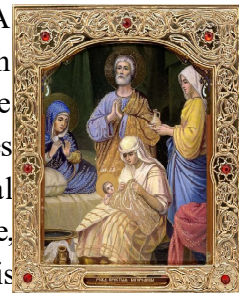
In India, Teacher’s Day is celebrated every year on 5th September as a mark of accolade to the part played by the teachers in the society. The Celebrations began 60 years ago and therefore, a week of “గురు దేవో భవ” is celebrated. 5th September is the birth anniversary of a great mentor



Dr. Sarvapalli Radhakrishnan, who was a grand advocate of edification, and was the distinguished envoy, academician, and India’s President, above all a great Teacher. Teacher’s Day is one of the events that is looked up by the students and the teachers in a similar way on this juncture it is the teachers who are praised. On this day, students comprehend how important is the role of a teacher in a student’s life. Teachers should always be respected. Teachers need support and encouragement from the society to sense that their fidelity to scholars is treasured and cherished. In India, on the eve of Teachers Day, the National Awards are given to the Teachers by the President of India on 5th September. The award is given as a public gratitude to praiseworthy teachers working in the primary schools, middle schools and secondary schools. In fact it is a divine responsibility to guide and enlighten. He also said that India should regain the status of ‘Vishwaguru’ (leader in education) by giving high respect to teachers whom he asked to encourage students to think critically about issues concerning nation.

VI. Feast of Nativity of Blessed Virgin Mary: Girl Child Day (Sep. 8)

The Church has celebrated Mary’s birth since at least the sixth century. A September birth was chosen because the Eastern Church begins its Church year with September. The September 8 date helped determine the date for the feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8. Scripture does not give an account of Mary’s birth. However, the apocryphal Protoevangelium of James fills in the gap. This work has no historical value, but it does reflect the development of Christian piety. According to this



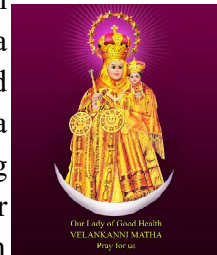
account, Anna and Joachim are infertile but pray for a child. They receive the promise of a child who will advance God’s plan of salvation for the world. Such a story, like many biblical counterparts, stresses the special presence of God in Mary’s life from the beginning. Saint Augustine connects Mary’s birth with Jesus’ saving work. He tells the earth to rejoice and

shine forth in the light of her birth. “She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth the nature inherited from our first parents is changed.” The opening prayer at Mass speaks of the birth of Mary’s Son as the dawn of our salvation, and asks for an increase of peace.

Reflection: We can see every human birth as a call for new hope in the world. The love of two human beings has joined with God in his creative work. The loving parents have shown hope in a world filled with travail. The new child has the potential to be a channel of God’s love and peace to the world. This is all true in a magnificent way in Mary. If Jesus is the perfect expression of God’s love, Mary is the foreshadowing of that love. If Jesus has brought the fullness of salvation, Mary is its dawning. Birthday celebrations bring happiness to the celebrant as well as to family and friends. Next to the birth of Jesus, Mary’s birth offers the greatest possible happiness to the world. Each time we celebrate her birth, we can confidently hope for an increase of peace in our hearts and in the world at large.

VII. Our Lady of Good Health – (Sep. 8)

There are three major events associated with Our Lady of Good of Health in Vailankanni. The Virgin Mary is said by tradition to have appeared to a shepherded boy named Tamil Krishnannesti Sankaranarayan who offered her child milk. She is subsequently said to have appeared to and healed a crippled boy selling buttermilk. A group of Portuguese sailors attribute being saved from a violent storm to her intercession. They constructed a larger chapel at their landing spot in Vailankanni. Around the end of the 16th century, a poor widow and her lame son lived in Vailankanni.

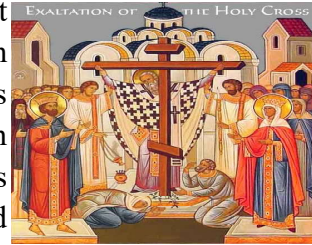


Every day the lame boy used to sit under a banyan tree at a place called ‘Nadu Thittu’ (central mound) and sell buttermilk to the thirsty wayfarers. One day, a very bright light appeared in front of him and from amidst the light, a Lady of peerless grace with a divine Child in her arms, asked the boy for a cup of butter-milk. Then she directed him to go and inform a catholic gentleman at Nagapattinam to put up a Chapel in her name on the spot of her apparition. The boy realized that his legs had become normal upon the word from the Lady. With great joy, he ran to Nagapattinam to carry out the errand. Having been already directed in a vision by Our Lady, the Catholic gentleman, with the support of the people, built a Chapel at ‘Nadu Thittu’ where now stands the present Shrine Basilica. The Lady was called, ‘Our Lady of Good Health’.

VIII. Feast of Exaltation of the Holy Cross (Sep. 14)

Early in the fourth century, Saint Helena, mother of the Roman Emperor Constantine, went to Jerusalem in search of the holy places of Christ’s life. She razed the second-century Temple of Aphrodite, which tradition held was built over the Savior’s tomb, and her son built the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher on that spot. During the excavation, workers found three crosses. Legend has it that the one on which Jesus died was identified when its touch healed a dying

woman. The cross immediately became an object of veneration. At a Good Friday celebration in Jerusalem toward the end of the fourth century, according to an eyewitness, the wood was taken out of its silver container and placed on a table together with the inscription Pilate ordered placed above Jesus' head: Then "all the people pass through one by one; all of them bow down, touching the cross and the inscription, first with their foreheads, then with their eyes; and, after kissing the cross, they move on." According to the story, the emperor intended to carry the cross back into Jerusalem himself, but was unable to move forward until he took off his imperial garb and became a barefoot pilgrim.



The cross is today the universal image of Christian belief. Countless generations of artists have turned it into a thing of beauty to be carried in procession or worn as jewelry. To the eyes of the first Christians, it had no beauty. It stood outside too many city walls, decorated only with decaying corpses, as a threat to anyone who defied Rome's authority—including Christians who refused sacrifice to Roman gods. Although believers spoke of the cross as the instrument of salvation, it seldom appeared in Christian art unless disguised as an anchor or the Chi-Rho until after Constantine's edict of toleration.

IX. Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows (Sep. 15)

The feast of Our Lady of Sorrows commemorates the seven great sorrows which Mary lived in relation to Her Son, as they are recorded in the Gospels or through Tradition. Today we are invited to reflect on Mary's deep suffering: 1. At the prophecy of Simeon: "You yourself shall be pierced with a sword - so that the thoughts of many hearts may be laid bare." (Luke 2:35). 2. At the flight into Egypt; "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt." (Mt 2:13). 3. Having lost the Holy Child at Jerusalem; "You see that



your father and I have been searching for you in sorrow." (Luke 2:48). 4. Meeting Jesus on his way to Calvary; 5. Standing at the foot of the Cross; "Near the cross of Jesus there stood His mother." (John 19:25). 6. Jesus being taken from the Cross; 7. At the burial of Christ. Prior to the Second Vatican Council, there were two feasts devoted to the sorrows of Mary. The first feast was instituted in Cologne in 1413 as expiation for the sins of the iconoclast Hussites. The second is attributed to the Servite order whose principal devotion are the Seven Sorrows. It was instituted in 1668, though the devotion had been in existence since 1239 - five years after the founding of the order.

X. Feast of St. Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist (Sep. 21)

St. Matthew, also called St. Matthew the Evangelist, St. Matthew the Apostle, or Levi, (flourished 1st century CE, Palestine; Western feast day September 21, Eastern feast day November 16), one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ and the traditional author of the

first Synoptic Gospel (the Gospel According to Matthew). According to Matthew 9:9 and Mark 2:14, Matthew was sitting by the customs house in Capernaum, when Jesus called him into his company. Assuming that the identification of Matthew with Levi is correct, Matthew (probably meaning “Yahweh’s Gift”) would appear to be the Christian name of Levi (called by Mark “Levi the son of Alphaeus”), who had been employed as a tax collector in the service of Herod Antipas, tetrarch of Galilee. Because Levi’s occupation was one that earned distrust and contempt everywhere, the scribes of the Pharisees criticized Jesus on seeing him eat with tax collectors and sinners, whereupon Jesus answered, “I came not to call the righteous, but sinners” (Mark 2:15–17). According to Luke 5:29, the aforementioned dinner was given by Levi in his house after his call. The Gospel According to Matthew was certainly written for a Jewish-Christian church in a strongly Jewish environment, but that this Matthew is definitely the Synoptic author is seriously doubted. Tradition notes his ministry in Judaea, after which he supposedly missioned to the East, suggesting Ethiopia and Persia. Legend differs as to the scene of his missions and as to whether he died a natural death or a martyr’s. Matthew’s relics were reputedly discovered in Salerno (Italy) in 1080. His symbol is an angel, and he is a patron saint of tax collectors and accountants.



XI. Feast of the Archangels (Sep. 29)

The liturgy celebrates the feast of these three archangels who are venerated in the tradition of the Church. Michael (Who is like God?) was the archangel who fought against Satan and all his evil angels, defending all the friends of God. He is the protector of all humanity from the snares of the devil.



Gabriel (Strength of God) announced to Zachariah the forthcoming birth of John the Baptist, and to Mary, the birth of Jesus. His greeting to the Virgin, “Hail, full of grace,” is one of the most familiar and frequent prayers of the Christian people. Raphael (Medicine of God) is the archangel who took care of Tobias on his journey. Angels are pure, created spirits. The name angel means servant or messenger of God. Angels are celestial or heavenly beings, on a higher order than human beings. Angels have no bodies and do not depend on matter for their existence or activity. They are distinct from saints, which men can become. Angels have intellect and will, and are immortal. They are a vast multitude, but each is an individual person. Archangels are one of the nine choirs of angels listed in the Bible. In ascending order, the choirs or classes are 1) Angels, 2) Archangels, 3) Principalities, 4) Powers, 5) Virtues, 6) Dominations, 7) Thrones, 8) Cherubim, and 9) Seraphim.

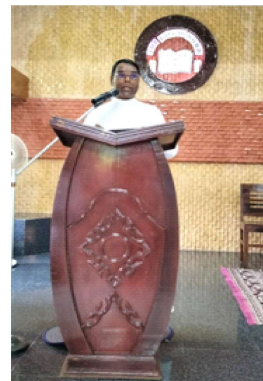

I. Title of the Project: Poverty Reduction among Poor and Marginalized rural households with Livelihoods, Ecological farming and Natural Resource Management in 22 villages of Dharmasagar and Velair mandals of Hanumakonda district

Achievements in August:

i) Trained 11 project staff on Ecological farming, Enriching compost, Green manure, Traditional crops, Millet crops and Improved vegetable Cultivation Methods.

ii) 120 farmers were provided with sprayer pumps, solar light traps, neem oil, growth promoter, yellow plates to promote ecological farming methods and to improve the soil fertility and soil nutrients.

iii) Distributed Mulching sheets, support net, pet wire, shady nets to 75 farmers to promote improved vegetable cultivation and get additional income and fresh vegetables for consumption purpose.

II. Title of the Project: Sustainable Livelihood Based Food Security program for the Tribal, Dalit and Backward Class Communities of 23 villages of Akkannapet Mandal of Siddipet district of Telangana State

Achievements in this reporting period:

- 262 Farmers were given training on Promotion of multi cropping, traditional crops and vegetable gardens.
- Five varieties of Vegetable seeds were distributed to 1146 women to promote kitchen gardens.

III. Food Security project in Chennaraopet Mandal

- We have identified and selected 200 farmers to promote Organic cultivation in 20 villages of Chennaraopet Mandal. We distributed 100 spray pumps and 200 liters of Neam Oil as per farmers' requirement.
- We have selected 200 farmers and distributed Yellow plates in 20 villages.

IV. Revolving Fund Loans:

- 92 beneficiaries of 3 villages were supported with the loan of Rs. 18,40,000/-
- 107 members of Fatima Mahila Sahakara Sangam were given general loan of Rs. 1,02,10,000/-
- Total Savings during the month of June: Rs. 3,87,350/-

V. Care and Support Program for HIV/Aids infected/affected children

- CABA program Bi-Monthly meeting was conducted for 200 CLHA/CAA in the month of August.
- Mandal level meeting was conducted with local stakeholders.
- Peer group meeting was held for 100 CLHA and 50 CAA children.
- Nutrition support and Education support was given to 150 children on 13-08-2025.
- As the part of CABA program, Vocational training on Motor vehicle driving and Computer PGDCA course was given to 5 CLHA children.
